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





Market Forces Driving Costs & Reducing Reimbursement


- Contract Staffing expense increased dramatically throughout FY22, stabilized late FY23 and into FY24.
- Clinical Staff recruitment/retention and cost has been an ongoing challenge across Georgia and the country as nurses age and retire.
- Drug Cost Increases
- Lack of Medicaid Expansion in Georgia
 - Georgia is one of the states with highest uninsured % and lowest reimbursed Medicaid program.
 - Georgia has forgone Billions of Dollars in reimbursement since ACA passage.
- Commercial Payer reimbursement shifts to "less costly" settings
- Government Payment Reductions (Medicare, DSH, 340B)
- Employed Physician/CRNA/APP cost rising with very little reimbursement increases
- Increased Administration Burdens/Cost/Regulations

Assumption is a stable payer mix and current contract reimbursement rates for 2025



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


Signage will be placed throughout Tower One & Two to guide patients and visitors around the facility.
