RESOLUTIONS OF THE HOSPITAL AUTHORITY OF ALBANY-DOUGHERTY COUNTY, GEORGIA

WHEREAS, the Hospital Authority of Albany-Dougherty County, Georgia (the "Authority") is a public body, corporate and politic of the State of Georgia, created under the Hospital Authorities Law, O.C.G.A. Section 31-7-70, et seq (the "Act"), and jointly activated by the City of Albany, Georgia the ("City") and Dougherty County, Georgia (the "County") pursuant to a resolution jointly adopted by the City and the County on July 22, 1941 and August 4, 1941; and

WHEREAS, on December 21, 2010, the Authority unanimously adopted resolutions (the "Prior Resolutions") by which it adopted and approved the execution and delivery of an Asset Purchase Agreement (the "Agreement") pursuant to which the Authority is to purchase substantially all of the assets of Hospital Corporation of America and its affiliates used exclusively as part of the Palmyra Medical Center (the "Assets"), which Agreement was executed by the Authority on December 21, 2010; and

WHEREAS, the Assets constitute a Project as defined in the Act and under the Act the Authority may lawfully purchase and operate the same; and

WHEREAS, recently the Federal Trade Commission and the Attorney General of the State of Georgia (collectively, the "Plaintiffs") filed a Complaint in the United States District Court for the Middle District of Georgia, Albany, Georgia Division (the "Court"), seeking, among other things, to temporarily and permanently enjoin the Authority from acquiring the Assets; and

WHEREAS, the Court issued an order ("Order") temporarily restraining acquisition of the Assets under the Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Authority will file its response and other pleadings with the Court, which will deny many of Plaintiffs' allegations, including the allegations to the effect that it is a "rubber stamp" or "straw man" for the various Phoebe entities; and

WHEREAS, in view of Plaintiffs' allegations contained in their Court filings as well as the actions of Plaintiffs in filing with the Court, the Authority is again reviewing and considering its actions and decisions of December 21, 2010; and

WHEREAS, having again reviewed and considered the Authority's decision to approve and execute the Agreement, the Authority members see nothing that would cause the Authority to change its earlier decision to seek to acquire and operate the Assets; and

WHEREAS, the Authority continues to find that the acquisition of the Assets pursuant to the Agreement will materially further the mission and purpose of the Authority for the benefit of the community it serves; and

WHEREAS, in view of the Order, the Authority recognizes that the potential act of leasing the Assets to Phoebe Putney Memorial Hospital, Inc. need not be considered further, unless and until the Court lifts the Order and the transaction is closed, so that the Authority's prior direction to its attorneys to undertake the initial development of such a lease draft is premature.

NOW THEREFORE, the Authority hereby adopts the following Resolutions:

- 1. <u>RESOLUTION 1</u>. BE IT RESOLVED, that after reviewing the allegations and complaints of the Plaintiffs, the members of the Authority hereby expressly reaffirm and ratify the previous decisions contained and reflected in the Prior Resolutions, it being the Authority's judgment and determination that such acquisition continues to be in the best interest of the citizens of Dougherty County, and will further the Authority's principal mission to provide such citizens quality healthcare at reasonable cost.
- 2. <u>RESOLUTION 2</u>. BE IT RESOLVED, that the Authority instructs its attorneys, its officers and litigation committee to take whatever action they deem necessary and appropriate to protect the rights of the Authority to acquire and operate the Assets and to resist the attempts of the Plaintiffs to interfere with the closing of the transaction, so that the same may take place as soon as possible.
- 3. <u>RESOLUTION 3</u>. BE IT RESOLVED, that until the further direction of the Authority and the acquisition of the Assets is complete, the agents and attorneys of the Authority are hereby directed to suspend all work as previously directed, to seek to develop a potential lease between the Authority and PPMH regarding the leasing of the Assets.





Operating Income vs. Average Rate Increase vs. CPI




2010 Average Charge for Uncomplicated Vaginal Delivery Regional Perinatal Centers


Phoebe Introduces HealthTeacher To Benefit the Region's Children

Phoebe Generates \$895 Million To Local Economy

In 2009, Phoebe generated more than \$895 million in revenue for the local economy, according to a recent report by the Georgia Hospital Association, the state's largest hospital trade association. The report also found that, during the same time period, Phoebe provided approximately \$34 million in uncompensated care while sustaining more than 3,400 full-time jobs throughout Albany and 6,901 in the rest of the state.

The report revealed that Phoebe had direct expenditures of more than \$362 million in 2009. When combined with an economic multiplier developed by the United States Department of Commerce's Bureau of Economic Analysis, the total economic impact of those expenditures was more than \$895 million.

"This new report shows that, even in these difficult economic times, Phoebe has an enormous positive impact on our local economy," said Joel Wernick, President/CEO of Phoebe.

While Phoebe remains a major component of the area's economic engine, the hospital's leadership, like the rest of the Georgia hospital community, is concerned about a wide array of economic challenges that have made it increasingly difficult to meet the community's health care needs including continued cuts in Medicare and Medicaid payments and a fastgrowing uninsured population. Presently, more than a third of all hospitals in Georgia are operating with negative margins.

"We're extremely concerned with the current operating environment for hospitals," said Wernick. "We've made a commitment to every citizen of this community to be on call for them 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. We are a safety net hospital with increasing numbers of uninsured patients who must have access to care, and in a difficult economy reimbursement for Medicaid continues to

decline."

According to Wernick, state lawmakers must work to protect the state's health care system with the same fervor that they do other initiatives like education and public utilities.

"It is our hope, even in these challenging economic times, our elected lawmakers will do what is necessary to protect our local health care system and preserve access to health care for every resident of Southwest Georgia."

Vancy Millan Lives Her American Dream

As a result of her and her family's hard work and dedication, Nancy Millan, medical lab technician at Phoebe,

became an American citizen on March 1, 2011.

"My father brought me, my brother and mother here from Mexico when I was 7-years-old. He had been working in the fields and in restaurants making a stable life for our family," she said. Millan was the first of her family to attend college and graduate. She graduated from Darton College with an


Associate of Science degree in Medical Laboratory and has worked in the lab at Phoebe for 4 years.

Steve Wallace Sheds Light on 'Watt' It Takes To Keep the Bulbs Burning

For 15 years, Steve Wallace has been helping keep the lights on at Phoebe Putney Memorial Hospital and its outlying facilities - one light bulb at a time.

Termed by his supervisor as a "lighting engineer" and as "The Light Man" by fellow Phoebe employees, Wallace's main job on the Plant Operations team is changing light bulbs at the main hospital and at facilities on Phoebe's campuses in Dougherty, Lee and Camilla.

While that seems like a simple job, just twisting a new bulb into a light receptacle, his supervisor Charlie Hawks says there is a lot of responsibility that goes with putting the right bulb in the right place. There are hundreds of different kinds of light bulbs, and different wattages, colors, shapes, sizes and purposes for each bulb. Not to mention, Phoebe adds new light receptacles with each struction project.

Phoebe eventually grew to the size that Plants Ops needed one person dedicated to the important job of changing light bulbs, so Plant Ops Director David Paul chose Wallace. Hawks explained that Wallace is

not unlike other Plant Ops team members, who individually specialize in electrical, mechanical and architectural jobs. According to Hawks, Paul has said, "There's an art to lighting," particularly when it comes to consistency in color. Wallace "has taken the job and he handles it," Hawks said. "I don't worry about lights at all with Steve. He's self-

Wallace comes in at odd hours with a portable lift to change bulbs in the ceiling of the main lobby in spite of his dislike for heights. Because his job impacts patient safety, he ensures that the various lights in patient rooms - for direct and indirect lighting - work so that physicians and nurses can effectively do their jobs. Priority areas, where lighting is crucial, Wallace said, is in Labor/Delivery, the Emergency Center and in units, particularly SICU, CCU, MICU, ICU and the Operating Room.

There are also lights that are taken for granted, such as exterior lights, elevator lights and LED signs throughout the

buildings.

His job is also to provide illumination without inconveniencing others at work, so often he must wait until nights and weekends to do routine lighting maintenance.

"Let there be light" is a common phrase Wallace says he hears, as well as "I need the 'Light Man' up here." Hearing those familiar words makes him feel good. "It's something I love doing," he said.

When he hears Phoebe family members say, "We can see now," he feels he's made a difference in their day or their

But he says with a chuckle that he doesn't like changing light bulbs at home. "I get more appreciation here at Phoebe."

Phoebe Nurse Obtains Progressive Critical Care Nurse Certification

Kendra Armstrong, R.N., is the first nurse at Phoebe Putney Memorial Hospital to obtain the Progressive Critical Care Nurse Certification.

The PCCN specialty certification was introduced in 2004 for nurses providing care to acutely ill adult patients regardless of where they provide nursing care, according to the American Association of Critical Care Nurses. Nurses with this certification may work in such areas as intermediate care, direct observation, stepdown, telemetry, transitional care or emergency departments.

This specialty certification provides patients and their families with validation that the nurse caring for them has demonstrated experience, knowledge and skills in the complex specialty of critical care. As a voluntary process, specialty certification points to nurses' commitment to career development and dedication to patient care, particularly in this constantly changing healthcare environment. "What an accomplishment," said Armstrong during a

brief interview before she started her evening shift. "It validates that you do know what you're doing and you know why you do what you do. What a plus for the patients," she said.

Obtaining certification was a one-year pursuit for Armstrong, who began her nursing career in 1994 in Oklahoma. She works in the Cardiovascular Surgery/Medical Cardiology Unit, where she is a charge nurse and preceptor for the unit. She started working at Phoebe as a licensed practical nurse in 2002, working in endocrinology. She completed her nursing degree at Darton College a few years later and has been a cardiac nurse since 2003.
